THE FABLE

A classical definition would number the series among fables, stories with a marvellous content; a fairy tale, since it deals with fairies, witches and wizards. Yet magic does not play the starring role. This is reserved for the inhabitants of Fairy Oak and the nature that surrounds it. So Fairy Oak is a fable about life, one that tells the story of a people, of a wild and lush Valley inhabited by extraordinary creatures. And since it also includes mice that foresee the future

and talking trees, it's a fable in the complete sense.

THE VALUES

Trust: In "Fairy Oak" people trust one another, almost always. Vanilla and Lavender share a deep trust in each other, even when they have thousands of reasons for doubt. Trust is also the fruit of the experience and wisdom of the adults of the village, who have faith in the youngsters.

Love: The love that binds the twins is ancestral, profound and invincible. The love between the village youngsters is romantic, decorous and discreet. The love between Dahlia and Cicero, the twins' parents, is solid and reassuring.

Friendship: plays a major role in the story, since it is thanks to this emotion that the most interesting, exciting, exhilarating, touching and important situations develop in all the stories.

THE PLOT

The plot is light-hearted and pleasing and is interpreted in a lively, modern style. The morphology of the village, its appearance, the personalities and relationships linking the characters, their life style, rituals and customs seem to engender a feeling of familiarity and affection in readers, and the desire to be a part of the story.

The success of Fairy Oak is largely due to the fact that girl readers identify with the principal characters of the story, the twins Vanilla and Lavender, who are identical in appearance, both positive, but with diametrically opposed personalities.

Two different personalities, two different ways of coping with adolescence, so that each reader has a model she can identify with. However some readers also identify with the twins' friends: Flox Pollimon and Shirley Poppy.



THE AUTHOR

Elisabetta Gnone is one of the most popular children's authors.

In the nineties she was in charge of the girls' and pre-school magazines published by the Walt Disney Company. In 2000 she created for Disney the series that became a worldwide phenomenon W.I.T.C.H which sparked a robust publishing programme that included comics, magazines, novels, DVD's and a television series.

Encouraged by this success, Elisabetta set to work once more, and in 2005 she created the Fairy Oak series, which won the hearts of millions of young readers in 23 countries, selling more than 3.8 million copies.

The new series Olga di carta, published in Italy by Adriano Salani Editore, reached the no. I position and dominated the Children's Chart in the weeks that followed.
